Our policy covers nutrition education, promotion, marketing, standards and guidelines for all food and beverages. UCS wellness policy also covers physical activity and education and well as other school-based activities that promote student wellness. The plan is updated as needed, minimally every three years and amended to fit the needs of the District.
